Slice 1: Welcome All Families

Goal 1: Build a Community of Belonging

- Home visits
- Visits to school followed by invitations to see what the children are doing
- Monthly drop-in sessions
- Open sessions in school to engage with learning on a weekly basis
- Personalizing letters to parents

Goal 2: Create an Inclusive Environment

- Signage in various languages
- Parent laundry mats and cafés in school
- Translators and childcare facilities
- Community activities after primary drop-off time
- Parent Liaisons and parent volunteer coordinators
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Slice 2: Communicate Effectively

Goal 1: Exchange Information Between School and Families

- Newsletters
- Text messaging alerts
- Use of website for information
- Phone, text, and email communication
- Principal calls parents directly

Goal 2: Facilitate Parent-Teacher Communication

- Parent Engagement Pledge learning compact
- Parent-teacher conferences
- Flexible scheduling for parent-teacher conferences
- Learning mentor building relationships with hard-to-reach parents
- Regular parent consultation

Slice 3: Support Student Success

Goal 1: Team-Up For Student Success

- Parent liaisons
- Fund more social workers
- Attendance officers employed by the school to target persistent absentees]

Goal 2: Support Learning by Engaging Families

- Reading workshops with parents listening to their child read
- Homework clubs
- Family learning days
- After-school clubs for children and parents with a craft focus
- Pyramid for Parents group

Slice 4: Speak Up for Every Child

Goal 1: Navigate the School System

- Advice on higher education
- Meetings with the principal once a month
- Parent council and parent governance
- Stakeholder day

Goal 2: Address Inequitable Outcomes and Access

- Use of language services, e.g., Language Line
- Parent-led curriculum
- Parents are invited to attend courses and workshops run by the school and external providers
- Special educational needs drop-in sessions
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Slice 5: Share Power

Goal 1: Strengthen the Family's Voice in Shared Decision Making

- Parental contributions to the school improvement plan
- Parent questionnaires and surveys
- PTA and parent council meetings

Goal 2: Build Families' Connections

- Family after-school clubs
- Family sports
- Buddy system for parents who want to come to school but are not at ease or confident alone
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Slice 6: Collaborate with the Community

Goal 1: Build a Strong Foundation for Community Partnerships

- Invitations to events where children are performing or receiving awards in and outside school
- Links with the children's center
- Engagement with city learning centers and library media centers
- Community fun day

Goal 2: Connect the School with Community Partners

- Theme days or weeks that involve external agencies
- Enterprise days
- Visits to the local university
- Collaborating with community organizations for charity events and fundraising activities
